Before You Enrol

- Verify that you are auto-enrolled in your required courses. If you are not, [contact your Program Administrator](#).
- For instructions on how to enrol in courses, visit [MyServiceHub Support](#).
- When selecting courses on Table I, refer to the [Transferability Guidelines](#) to ensure you are completing the required courses for program transfer.
- If you have received transfer credits for first-year courses, you may select courses from Year 2 (or higher). If you have not yet received confirmation of your transfer credits, enrol in your first-year courses and be prepared to drop them if your transfer credits are approved. In all cases, it is recommended that you [contact your Program Administrator](#).

Choosing Your Courses

- The typical course load is 5 courses per semester. If you wish to reduce or increase your course load, [contact your Program Administrator](#).
- Open Electives can be found under "My Classes Offered" on MyServiceHub. Courses are organized by teaching faculty and then alphabetically by course code. With more than 500 Open Electives available, focus your search on areas that interest you. More information about courses is available in the [Undergraduate Calendar](#).
- To determine which courses are required to meet your program graduation requirements, use the [Academic Advisement Report](#).
- When enrolling in Liberal Studies courses (Table A or Table B) beginning in second year, be aware that some

courses are not eligible for Liberal Studies credit. Refer to [Table A – Lower-Level Restrictions](#) and [Table B – Upper-Level Restrictions](#). Liberal Studies courses are part of your second-year curriculum and should not be taken during your first year.

- Some courses offer a wait list option. To add yourself to a wait list, visit [Course Wait List](#).

Classes & Course Information

- Classes are typically scheduled as either one 3-hour lecture each week or one 2-hour lecture plus one 1-hour tutorial each week.
- Instructors will provide course outlines, including required textbooks, through D2L Brightspace on the first day of classes.
