Integrating Health and Social Care – Evidence, Best Practices and Knowledge Networks

CRNCC's international partner, the Centre for Health Improvement and Leadership in Lincoln (CHILL), hosted their 2nd International Leadership Conference at the University of Lincoln, UK. The conference included presentations and workshop sessions by leaders in the UK Health Service and fellow international academics in Health and Social Policy.

CHILL is a unique, national centre based at the University of Lincoln, which builds partnerships between academics, practitioners and policy-makers. It draws on such disciplines as management, leadership, workforce development, health practice and information and communication technology.

4. RESEARCH IN PROGRESS

The CRNCC has recently connected a group of researchers (Dr. Janet Lum, Ryerson University, and Drs. Raisa Deber and Paul Williams, University of Toronto) with a CRNCC member, *Waterloo Wellington Community Support Services Network (WWCSSN)*, to develop and apply a methodology for health and social care resource allocation for seniors. This “balance of care” approach was pioneered by researchers at the **Personal Social Services Research Unit (PSSRU), University of Manchester, UK**. Dr. David Challis, PSSRU head, will also collaborate on this study which will bring representatives from health and community service sectors together to clarify how the distribution of resources invested in 'institutional care' (e.g. hospital and long-term care) and those resources invested in 'home and community care' can best be managed to improve outcomes for those currently on the CCAC waiting list for long term care institutionalization. The project, scheduled to begin in the fall of 2006 will provide information that can be used to guide both priority setting for long-term care placements and future investments in community and institutional care.

While the CRNCC does not conduct research, it will keep members updated on this research and its outcomes.
