~ From Idea to Action ~ Supportive Housing

Presented by CRNCC in collaboration with the Ontario Community Support Association (OCSA) on October 15, 2006

A growing body of national and international evidence points to the importance of supportive housing in maintaining the well-being, independence and quality of life of individuals, as well as the role it can play in sustaining the health care system. Yet, in Ontario, supportive housing remains below the policy radar.

This symposium aims to answer these key questions

1. How do we make supportive housing happen? How do we get supportive housing on the political agenda?
2. There are many ways to combine affordable housing with support services. Which model is best for your community?

To answer these questions, the symposium will focus on:

- making a quality of care and financial case for supportive housing to political decision-makers;
- presenting growing evidence on costs and outcomes for individuals and the health system to demonstrate the crucial role of supportive housing in the continuum of care;
- exploring supportive housing models from across Canada and internationally, which share a common underlying theme – secure affordable housing with support services;
- and highlighting both opportunities and challenges for translating knowledge into practice at both policy making and service delivery levels.

Research in Progress

Update on the Balance of Care Project

The Balance of Care study is a collaborative project among researchers at the University of Toronto, Ryerson University and health care managers in Waterloo, Ontario. Project participants are currently examining the proportion of seniors on the long-term care facility waiting list in Waterloo, Ontario that can be diverted to the community if given integrated packages of care. The project is funded by the CIHR Team in Community Care and Health Human Resources and supported by the Canadian Research Network for Care in the Community (CRNCC). The CRNCC fostered the researcher/care manager collaborative and will

facilitate knowledge dissemination throughout the duration of the project.

The Balance of Care Steering Committee and Expert Panel have been established and will continue to meet extensively throughout the summer months to implement the Balance of Care methodology. Alongside project implementation, researchers have been invited by many community groups in and around Toronto to present the model (I.e. London Health Providers Alliance, Independent Living Service Providers, and Alzheimer Society of Ontario). Since the Balance of Care provides a framework for effectively mobilizing resources for frail seniors, the study has become a project of interest as Ontario moves to a regionalized model of care delivery.

Request for Expression of Interest ~ House Calls Research Project

This Request for Expression of Interest is being issued on behalf of a collaborative partnership between Dr. Mark Nowaczynski, home based physician, VHA Home HealthCare (VHA), COTA Health (COTA) and Senior People Resources in North Toronto (SPRINT), to initiate a project to serve the frail elderly in their homes.

The House Calls project has been created to develop and implement a community-based interdisciplinary team service delivery model, which provides ongoing primary care of frail seniors as they age in place.
