Look Globally - Act Locally: Integrated Care Systems October 2008

This symposium, presented by the Canadian Research Network for Care in the Community (CRNCC) and the Ontario Community Support Association (OCSA), features top speakers from Canada and from European countries

such as Austria, the Netherlands, Finland, and the United Kingdom. These countries have implemented or are currently implementing integration initiatives. A key goal is to learn more about what works, what does not, and what needs to be done at the local level to ensure success.

Topics include:

- which populations are targeted
- what services are included
- who decides
- who pays and how
- how are outcomes measured
- how are providers and funders held accountable
- What is the role of informal and family care givers

Who should attend: policy makers (LHINs, MOHLTC), researchers, managers (CCACs), and community service providers.

This symposium builds on the success of the CRNCC and OCSA conference on Supportive Housing that was held on October 15, 2007,
