Linked to respect for human rights, climate change and inclusive trade


Risks and Opportunities

Prevention

- From Ottawa:
 - •Work with the Canadian business community, civil society, foreign governments and communities
 - Foster and promote responsible business practices
 - •Increase awareness of key international standards and guidelines
 - Support sustainable economic growth and shared values
- From our missions across Canada and around the world:
 - Advise Canadian companies on risks in specific markets and sectors
 - Advocate on behalf of Canadian industry abroad
 - Promote the uptake RBC and related tools and products

Legislation

- Laws and regulations of local market
- Canadian obligations when doing business abroad
- Corruption of Foreign Public Officials Act
- Extractive Sector Transparency Measures Act
- •2020 Amendments to the Customs Tariffs Act
 - •Applies to all goods, irrespective of country of origin
 - Applies to inputs, materials and consumption
 - •New Fighting Against Forced Labour and Child Labour in Supply Chains Act
 - •Supply chain transparency-comes into force Jan 1, 2024



Dispute Resolution

Canada's National Contact Point for RBC (NCP)

- Promotes and raises awareness of the OECD Guidelines for Multinational Enterprises
- Non-judicial dispute-resolution mechanism to resolve complaints and specific instances of companies not operating within the Guidelines
- All business sectors
- Works internationally to support the work of the OECD and a global network of NCPs

Canadian Ombudsperson for Responsible Enterprise (CORE)

- Mandated to review allegations of human rights abuses arising from Canadian company operations abroad
- Mining, oil & gas and garment sectors
- Promotes OECD Guidelines for Multinational Enterprises, and United Nations Guiding Principles on Business and Human Rights


