

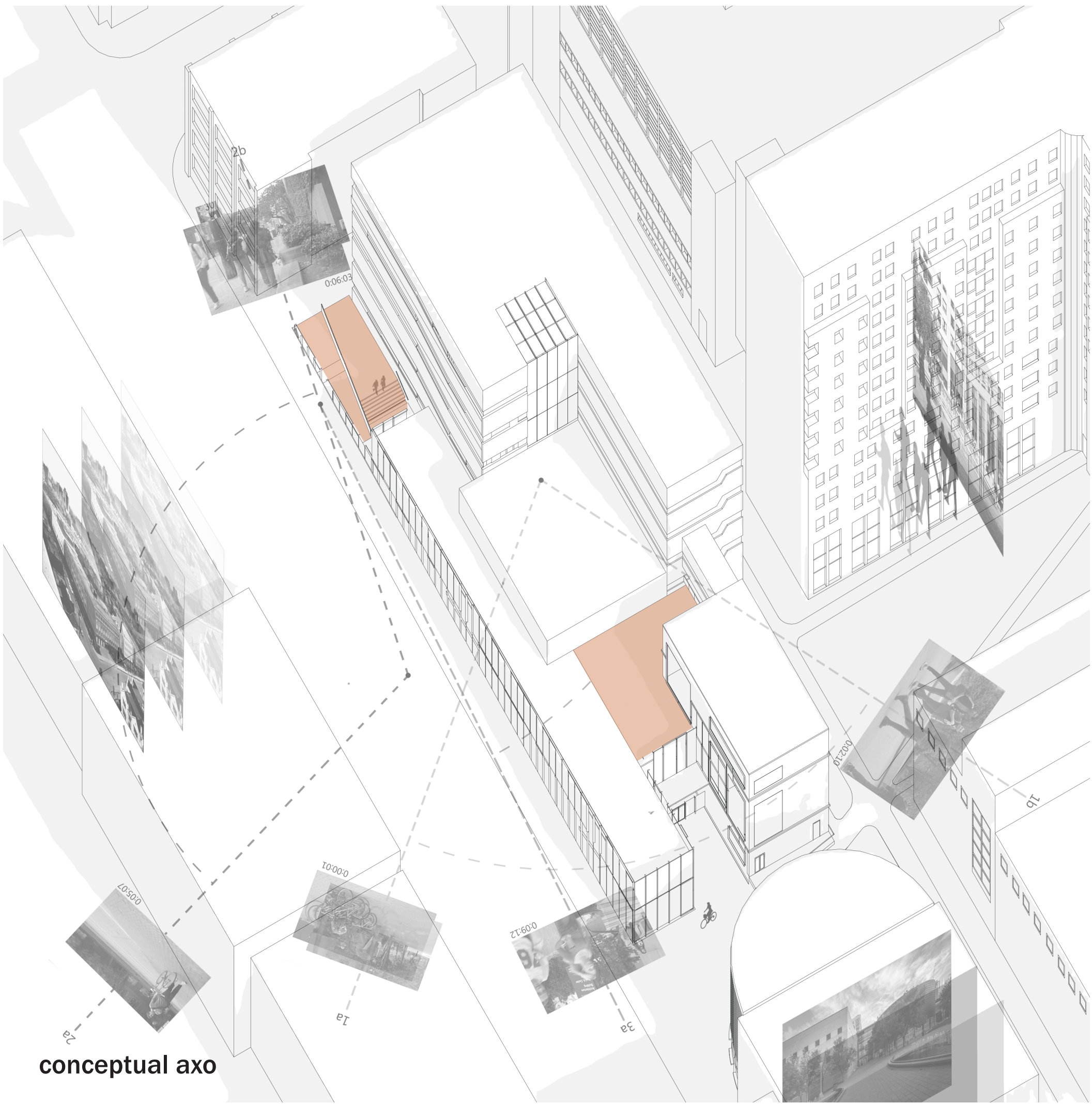

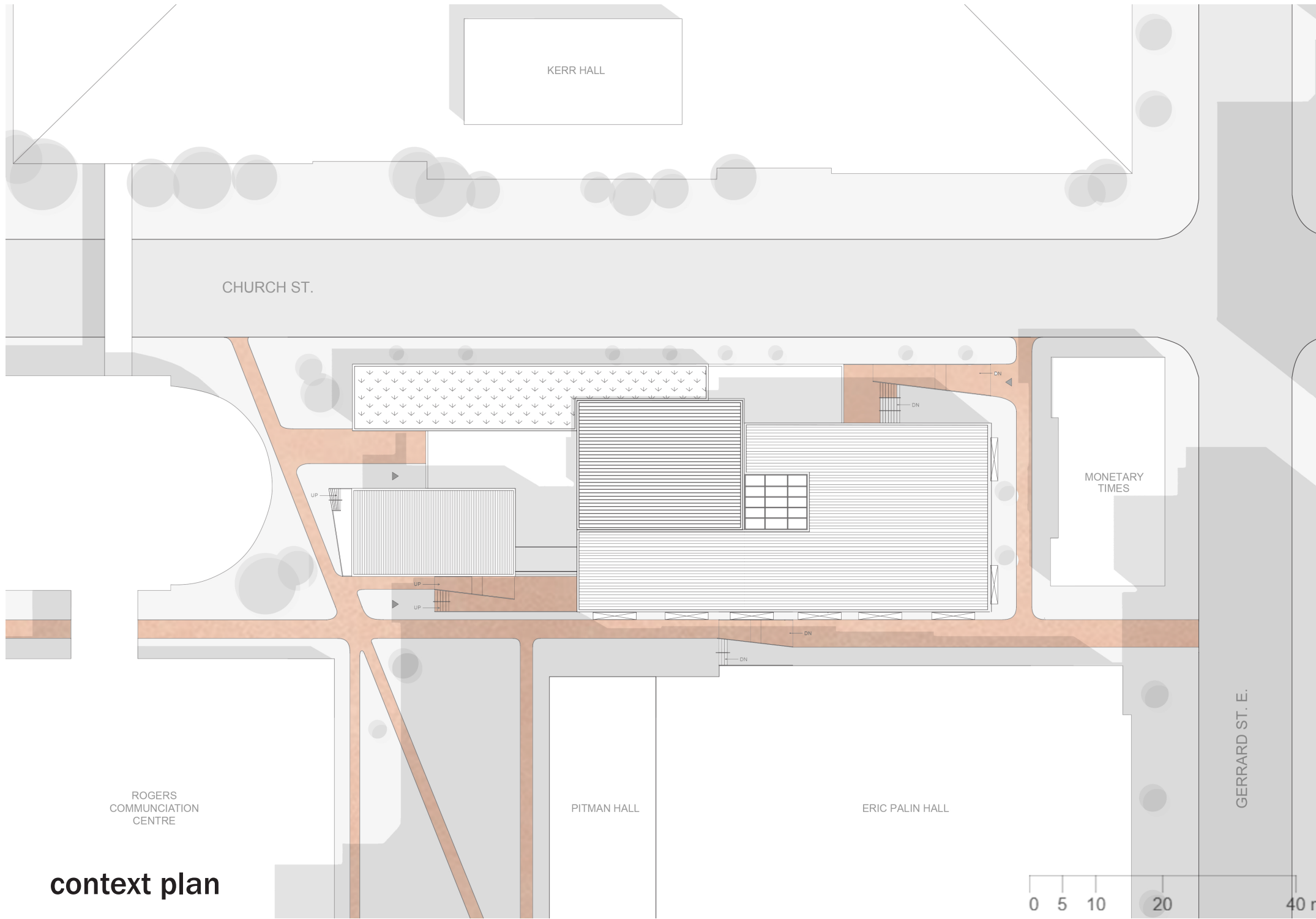
# DAS URBAN CAMPUS

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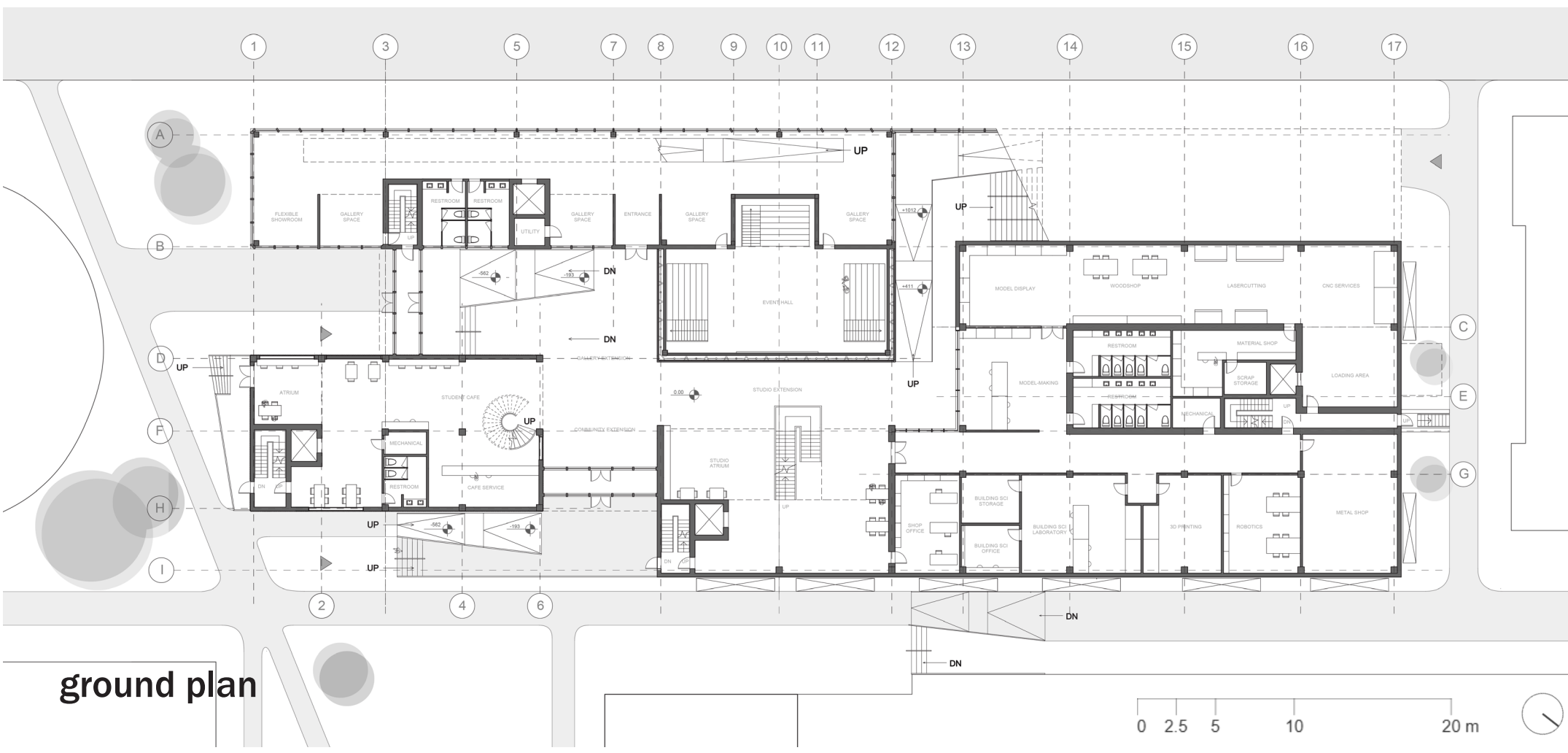
The DAS Urban Campus is a complete reinvention of the current TMU Architectural Science Building on 325 Church Street. Considering the building has served its time, the proposal centers around a new school of architecture that solves the site’s lack of pedestrian and cyclist access, while simultaneously transforming it into a place of memorability and community-building. The fully accessible project is made up of three fragmented pavilions: a gallery-event hall, studio building, and community hub. Moreover, these distinct volumes are all connected by an enclosed path that encourages students to meander through an interstitial urban campus. Each building serves as an apparatus, teaching and informing its students through its varying construction materials. More specifically, the gallery-event hall is composed of steel, the studio building remains concrete, while the community hub is composed of mass timber.



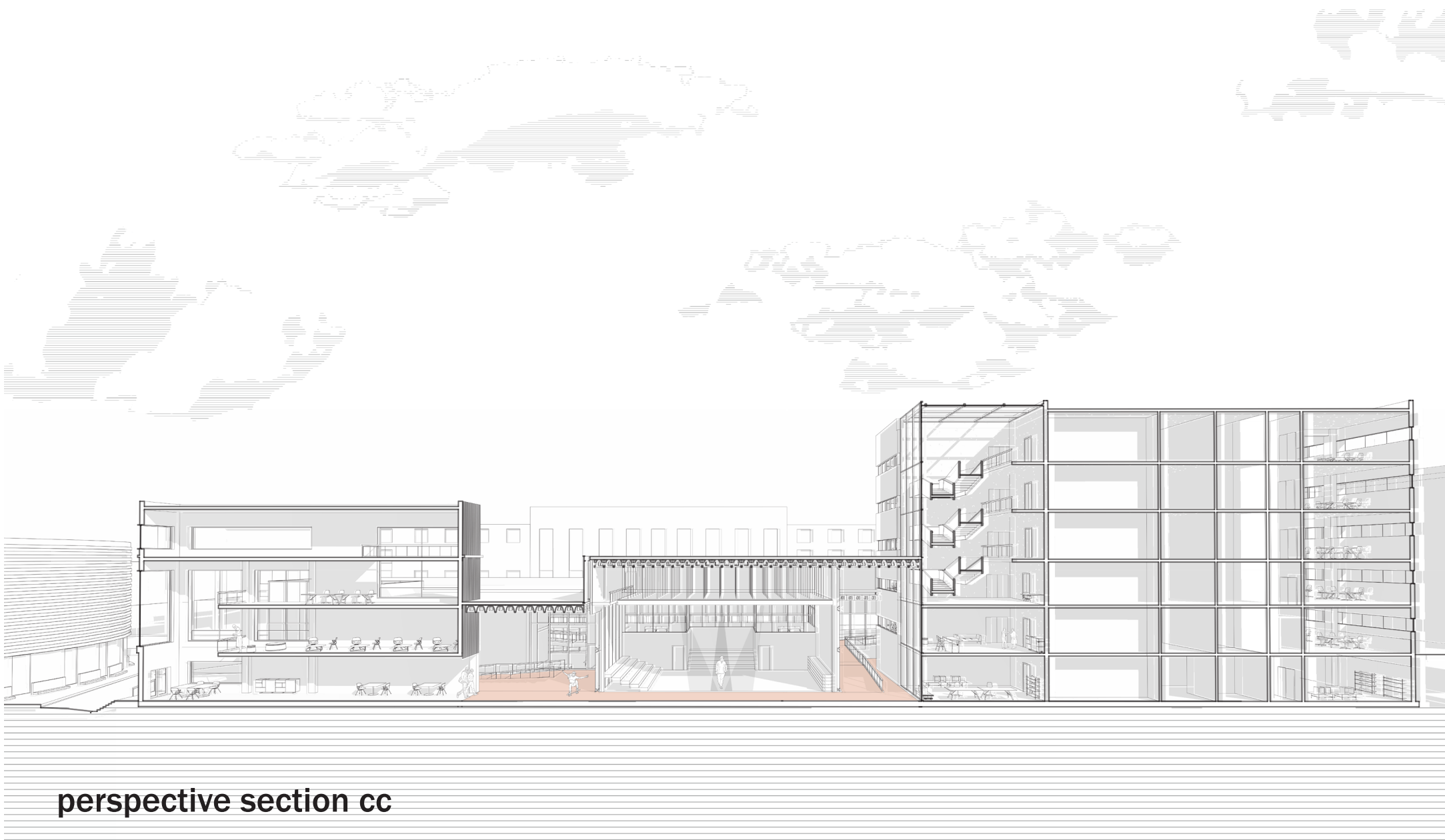

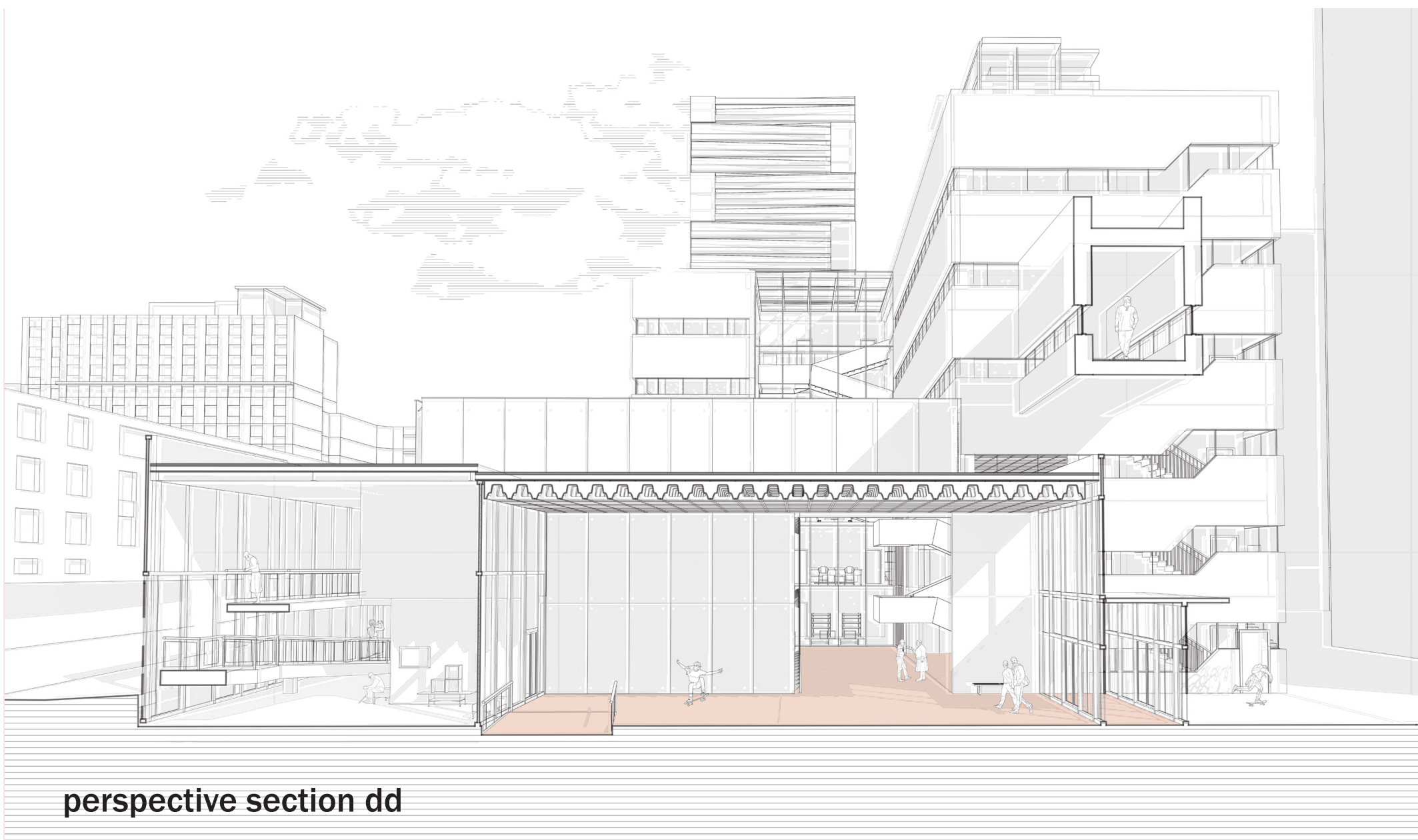
context plan
