

BI-CAMERAL GOVERNANCE

Like many universities, Toronto Metropolitan University (the “University”) operates under a bi-cameral governance structure. This means that it has two governing bodies: the Board of Governors (the “Board”) and the Senate. The mandate of each of these bodies is defined in the *Toronto Metropolitan University Act*. Each body is responsible for the issues within its area of exclusive jurisdiction and may not intrude into the responsibilities of the other. However, a full understanding of the University and its governance requires an appreciation of the powers of both the Board and the Senate.

Board of Governors

As a simple guide, the University is a corporation composed of the members of the Board. The primary powers of the Board, as outlined in the *Toronto Metropolitan University Act*, are for the government, conduct, management and control of the University and its property, revenues, expenditures, business and affairs. This includes university-wide non-academic policy formulation, as well as oversight and decision-making related to financial and management matters.

There are twenty-four (24) members of the Board including the Chancellor, the President and Vice-Chancellor, nine (9) external members appointed by the Government of Ontario (Lieutenant Governor in Council), two (2) external members appointed by the Board, three (3) alumni members, three (3) faculty members, two (2) staff members, and three (3) student members. The normal term of office is three (3) years for public and alumni members, two (2) years for faculty and staff members, and one (1) year for student members. Except in the case of students, elections are on a staggered basis to provide some continuity from year to year. Board members are eligible for re-appointment or re-election as the case may be. The Chair and Vice-Chair of the Board are elected by its members. The Board is supported by the Secretary of the Board; the Assistant Secretary of the Board; the Program Manager, Governance; and the Governance and Projects Coordinator.

Further details on the composition and Committees of the Board, related mandates, and specific powers assigned to the Board and its Committees are outlined in detail in both the *Toronto Metropolitan University Act* and *By-Law No. 1 being the General By-Laws of Toronto Metropolitan University*. Senate

Toronto Metropolitan University's Senate is responsible for maintaining, communicating, and implementing the University's policies related to academic matters. These include the content and quality of all programs and courses of study, the standards for admission to the University, and the qualifications for obtaining degrees, diplomas and certificates. Much of the Senate's work is done through its Standing Committees. These Committees include Academic Governance & Policy; Scholarly Research & Creative Activity; Senate Appeals; Senate Priorities; Academic Standards; Awards & Ceremonials; Senate Learning and Teaching; Nominations & Elections; Health Sciences Research Ethics Board; and the General Research Ethics Board. The Academic Standards Committee, for example, does a comprehensive review of all new program proposals, and is also responsible for the periodic review of existing programs, all of which are brought to the Senate for final approval; the Awards & Ceremonials Committee approves the awarding of all degrees, including Honorary Doctorates; and the Senate Appeals Committee considers students' final appeals of their grades, academic standing, and findings of academic misconduct.

Senate is composed of twenty-four (24) *ex-officio* members – the Chancellor, the President and Vice-Chancellor (who is the Chair of the Senate), Vice-Presidents (including the Provost), Vice Provosts, Deans, Registrar, and Chief Librarian – as well as sixty-two (62) elected representatives of the University's faculty, students and alumni, and seven (7) non-voting Senate Associates. Senate meetings are typically held on the first (1st) Tuesday of each month from October through June and are held eight (8) times each academic year.
