Option 1: MN Course Stream

Students are required to successfully complete 10 course credits

- 5 Core Required Courses
- 2 Field of Study Required Courses
- 3 Elective Courses
- Designed for both full and part-time students
- ✓ Courses are scheduled during all three semesters (Fall, Winter, Spring)
- ✓ Students are expected to maintain continuous enrolment
- Courses are offered during the weekdays only
- ✓ Program delivery is onsite

Option 2: MN Thesis Stream

Students are required to successfully complete 6 core credits and a thesis

- 5 Core Required Courses
- 1 Field of Study Required Course
- Thesis (Equal to 4 Credits)
- ✓ Designed for full-time students <u>ONLY</u>
- ✓ Courses are scheduled during all three semesters (Fall, Winter, Spring)
- ✓ Students are expected to maintain continuous enrolment
- ✓ Courses are offered during the weekdays only

Prepares students for health promotion, patient care, and community and public health roles. Covers advanced knowledge in nursing, theories of health and illness, and enhancing and promoting health

Time-to-completion Options


Option 1: MN Course Stream

Full-time students have a maximum of 5 terms to complete all program requirements while part-time students have a maximum of 9 terms or 3 years.

Option 2: MN Thesis Stream

Full-time option only with a maximum of 6 terms or 2 years.





Toronto Metropolitan University Applying to the Program

Option 1 - MN Course Stream

Admission Requirements

- Bachelor's degree in Nursing (or equivalent) from a program accredited by CASN or approved by the appropriate provincial body
- Minimum overall B (3.00 CGPA or 70%) average in their undergraduate nursing program, with at least a B+ (3.33 GPA or 77%) in the final half or last 20 one-term/semester courses
- Demonstrated capacity to succeed in a graduate program. It is expected that the candidate will have obtained good academic standing in non-nursing and nursing subjects
- Two Letters of Recommendation, one of which must be academic



Option 2 - MN Thesis Stream

Admission Requirements

- Bachelor's degree in Nursing (or equivalent) from a program accredited by CASN or approved by the appropriate provincial body
- Minimum overall B+ (3.33 CGPA or 77%) average in their undergraduate nursing program, with at least a A- (3.67 GPA or 80%) in the final half or last 20 one-term/semester courses
- Demonstrated capacity to succeed in a graduate program. It is expected that the candidate will have obtained good academic standing in non-nursing and nursing subjects
- Two Letters of Recommendation, one of which must be academic
- Clear evidence of research potential
- Description of proposed research



Application Details

- The First Consideration deadline date is January 20, 2025
 - All Required and Supplementary Supporting Documents (including Reference Letters) must be submitted by this date
- After January 20, 2025 applications will continue to be accepted to the MN program until it is full or admissions formally closes
- A non-refundable fee is payable to the Ontario Universities'
 Application Centre (OUAC) and must be submitted at the time of completing the online application

This might include contributions to publications/presentations, committees/projects, professional awards and/or scholarships, or significant involvement in continuing education. Graduate education requires a significant commitment. Detail how you will balance your career (including work hours) and your studies to secure your success in the program.

Written Submissions

- Your written submission contributes strongly toward determining whether you are selected for admission to the Master of Nursing Program
- The assessment scores based on ability to address the questions in a comprehensive and personal manner
- Answers that are overly brief and very general will receive a low score





Letters of Recommendation

<u>Academic Recommendation*</u> - One of the required references MUST be an Academic Letter of Recommendation (e.g., a professor who taught you during your previous degree and who can speak to your intellectual capabilities, capacity to engage in studies and research at a graduate level and leadership potential).

<u>Professional Recommendation</u> - The second Letter of Recommendation may be submitted by a professional (non-academic) referee. This reference should come from a supervisor who is familiar with your professional accomplishments (e.g., leadership, contribution to the profession, involvement in professional organizations).

*For those applicants that completed their undergraduate education more than five years ago, the Academic Letter of Recommendation may be substituted by a second Letter of Recommendation



Letters of Recommendation

Your referees should be able to speak to who you are and your abilities.

This can include:


- Your work in the community; community engagement; contributions as part of a team;
- Intellectual capabilities, work ethic, resilience and ability to overcome challenges, integrity, adaptability/ flexibility
- Capacity to engage in research or scholarship at a masters level, written communication skills,
- Leadership potential, critical thinking,
- Equity deserving groups How you might have overcome barriers to achieve success in your academic and professional life



Curriculum Vitae

Should include:

- Academic education (post-secondary degrees, diplomas, certificates)
- Continuing education (including workshops, professional development)
- Awards and honours
- Relevant presentations/publications/research
- Professional employment
- Current membership in professional organizations
- Committees (e.g., work related, professional)
- Relevant volunteer activities





Unofficial Transcripts

- Unofficial Transcripts are required from each post-secondary institution attended. Applicants from Ontario Universities and Colleges will have the option of ordering their transcripts while completing the OUAC application form (only one order required). If you choose this option you are exempt from submitting electronic copies with your package.
- Once an Offer of Admission is received and confirmed by the Applicant, the Applicant will be required to submit official transcripts.



Proof of Registration with the CNO

- Applicants are required to provide proof of current registration or proof of registration eligibility with the College of Nurses of Ontario by submitting a <u>Proof of Registration/Eligibility form</u> with required documentation (a copy of their License Renewal Receipt with registration number visible)
- Indicate on the form whether you have not yet written the CNO NCLEX-RN exam, and/or are not yet registered to practice as a Registered Nurse in the Province of Ontario. Any offer will be conditional upon registration with the CNO as a Registered Nurse by program start date. The University is not obligated to hold a spot in the program if the applicant cannot obtain a valid registration with the CNO as a Registered Nurse by program start date



Submitting the Application

- Incomplete applications will not be considered for admission.
- Applicants who submit all required and supplemental documentation by January 20,
 2025 will be given first consideration for admission.
- Because the number of applicants greatly exceeds the number of positions available, meeting our minimum admission requirement is not a guarantee of admission.

Funding

- ✓ TMU Graduate fellowship: Maximum \$12,000 each
 - available on a competitive basis to full-time students with an B+ or above average
- ✓ Graduate Departmental Awards: Maximum of \$5,000
 - distributed by the department on a merit basis and available to full-time students only
- ✓ Graduate Assistantships
- ✓ External Funding (OGS, CIHR, RNAO, etc.)
- ✓ OSAP





Fees

- ✓ Tuition for the MN program is course-based
- ✓ Established annually (approximately \$1,500 per course plus ancillary fees)
- ✓ Tuition fees charged to full-time and part-time students is the same
- ✓ Between \$15,000-\$20,000 total
