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Chair's Corner

f you follow my column, you know that it offers thematic narratives. This one is no exception, putting the accent on something that our discipline thrives on: collaboration.

Collaboration creates synergies among experience, knowledge, and method to propel an idea into innovative directions. Many collaborations happen across universities or borders, but it's particularly inspiring when they happen across the hallway and become the barometer of a department's vibrancy, as is the case for our department. Consider a few examples.

Morton Beiser and Wade Pickren have teamed up to study resilience in adult

refugees from Afghanistan, Burma, Colombia, and Ethiopia. Morton is also working with Alasdair Goodwill, and Patrizia Albanese (Sociology) and doctoral student Matilda Nowakowski to examine the impact of psycho-social factors on immigrant children's academic achievement. Another example of a synergistic partnership is found in David Day and Trevor Hart's collaboration which involves testing a mediational model of health-risk behaviours in a large sample of incarcerated juvenile offenders. Thus they work in concert conjoining specialities in injury-risk and sexual-risk behaviours. In a third example, Ben Dyson and Michelle Dionne combine expertise in cognitive and health psychology, as they work with undergraduate students to research variations in attentional bias in individuals with food and weight concerns; while doctoral student Jennifer Monforton with Kristin Vickers, and Martin Antony have recently submitted a manuscript

investigating social anxiety and upward counter-factual thinking, partnering expertise in social panic.

You can easily see the well rounded network that is being developed here—and that in some cases can even lead to significant funding, as seen in the case of Candice Monson, Naomi Koerner, and Tae Hart. Their collaboration on TRACE—Tracking Relationships and Reactions to Critical Events—was awarded significant CIHR funding to engage a multiplicity of perspectives in following recently traumatized individuals to determine risk and resilience factors associated with trauma recovery.

These are just a few samples of the impressive efforts in collaboration listed in the accolades section, on pg. 8.



With the graduate admissions process for Fall 2011 drawing to a close, we have confirmed acceptances from 9 new students in the psychological science MA program and 8 new students in the clinical MA program. We also will welcome a new student to our psychological science PhD program. All of our new students will be formally welcomed in the Fall issue of the Urban Psychologist. Of course, we also look forward to welcoming back our current second year MA students, as they transition to the PhD program in the Fall.

We also want to congratulate a number of graduate students on recent awards and accomplishments:

- Emma MacDonald was recently elected to the Executive of the Clinical Section of the Canadian Psychological Association (CPA). With the exception of the Student Section, this is the largest section of CPA, with close to 1000 members. Congratulations Emma!
- Congratulations to Brian Mainland, who recently received the Dennis Mock Student Leadership Award. Thanks to Brian for his contributions to the graduate program and Department, including his past role as President of the Psychology Graduate Students' Association.
- Caitlin Davey recently received the CPA Clinical Section Educational Activity Student Grant, in the amount of \$2000. This is the third year that CPA's clinical section has been offering this grant, and the second year in a row that students at Ryerson received it (only 1 or 2

- grants are awarded each year) an amazing accomplishment for our students. The grant will support a workshop on April 29, 2011 entitled, *Program Evaluation: A Focus on Realist Methodology*, presented by Dr. Souraya Sidani, Dr. Kelly McShane, and Caitlin Davey.
- Madelaine Burley and Ashley Ward each received a CIHR Health Professional Student Research Award. These awards are offered annually to health professional students enrolled in a Canadian program leading to licensure. Congratulations to both of you!
- Finally, best of luck to our PhD students, Madelaine Burley, Nicole Cormier, Brian Mainland, and Sarah Royal, who will graduate with their MA degrees in the June 2011 convocation.

We have two important updates in the clinical psychology program. First, a warm welcome to Dr. Shaun Burns, who began his position in January as the Director of our new psychology training clinic, based in a larger primary care clinic at St. Michael's Hospital (located at 80 Bond St., just a few steps away from Ryerson). Dr. Burns joins us from the VA Boston Medical Center and Harvard Medical School. Our first year MA students are gearing up to start their first practicum placement at the new clinic in June. Second, our accreditation self-study has now been submitted to the CPA. In the coming weeks, we look forward to CPA's decision regarding scheduling of an accreditation site visit.

Finally, please mark your calendars. Our annual Open House and Information Session for applicants to our graduate program will be held on Thursday October 20, 2011, in the evening. Details will appear on our website sometime this summer. We wish everyone a happy and safe Spring and Summer!


