

The Public Sector is One of The Largest Sectors in Canada

In the Federal government alone, there are over 300,000 employees, across 160 federal organizations, and it's growing as demonstrated below.¹

Whether you are interested in working on a federal, provincial, or municipal level, there are many options available in the public sector.



Federal

Municipal



What Type of Work Can You Expect?


Like the list of employers, the type of work you do largely depends on the level of government you work for and the mandate of the division.

Here is a table that outlines the roles and responsibilities that are often assigned to each level of government:




Skills to Succeed

Throughout my co-op journey, I had an opportunity to work for two Ministries of Ontario: at the Ministry of Government and Consumer Services as a Business Financial Officer and at the Ministry of Energy, Northern Development and Mines as a Project Analyst. In these roles, I have gathered tremendous experience in data analysis, improved my communication and technical skills. The two pieces of advice I carried away from these experiences were:

Never be afraid to step out of your comfort zone & show initiative towards the projects/ tasks you would like to contribute more to. Such drive and

willingness to put your best self forward is always encouraged.

Don't shy away from asking questions as you can utilize that as a

chance

to learn more and improve even further in your work!

What Are Crown Corporations?

These organizations are wholly owned by the state but run at arm's length from the government. In these situations, it is private enterprise who are providing services to the public. Crown corporations have been most common in sectors such as transportation, telecommunications, utilities and power generation, but they extend into many parts of the economy, including alcohol sales, gaming, finance, business development, insurance, agriculture and culture.5

A few examples of Crown Corporations that employ TRSM students are: Canada Post, Canada Pension Plan Investment Board, and Canadian Broadcasting Corporation (CBC).









They Also Offer Training Programs

The *Ontario Internship Program* is a training program for students who are in the last two years of their undergraduate program, or recent graduates. Interview Tips for Public Sector Positions



TIP #1

The Ontario Public Service (OPS) uses job interview panels made up of at least two, usually three people. They tend to use pre-set questions. To help you know what to expect, they have developed a tip sheet found in the 'Free Resources' section of this report. Read up on the kinds of questions that may be asked and how you can get up to speed on issues of concern for the Ministry you are applying to join.

TIP #2

Research the Ministry, the division and their values. Knowing how their values align with your own, is an important part of preparing for the interview. The Employee and Organization Directory, otherwise known as INFO-GO is a great tool that you can use to research several organizations. Click here to access the resource.



TIP #3
