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How to Land an Internship

Wondering how you can secure an internship placement for the Summer? Figuring out which companies hire Summer Interns? Or want to know what roles are available to you? A Summer Internship is a great way for students to gain valuable experience relevant to their field of study.



Internship vs. Co-op



Internship

An Internship is a non-academic role that typically takes place during the summer months. Depending on the company and role, Internships can be paid or unpaid experiences.



Co-op

The Ted Rogers Co-op Program is an academic program, in which students can participate in paid work terms year round. At TRSM, students enrolled in the Ted Rogers Co-op Program have the opportunity to complete four work terms to gain diverse experiences. Students enrolled in the Ted Rogers Co-op Program often extend their undergraduate journey by up to one year. Learn more here to see if the Ted Rogers Co-op Program is a fit for you!

Steps to Land an Internship

1 Start with your application

Your resume and cover letter is your invitation to an interview! Having a strong application can showcase your skills and how you meet the qualifications for the role. Tailor your application to let the recruiter know that you are the best fit for the role.



2 Finding variety of roles

Change what you are searching: Are you searching the same internship title over and over again on different job boards? Try broadening and expanding your search by leveraging different search terms.

For example, the nature of a Business Analyst role can be titled different things from company to company. Change up your search terms by looking at a variety of keywords or job titles that align with the nature of the role you are looking for.



Diversify where you're looking: What tools are you using to look for an internship? LinkedIn is a great tool but certainly not the only one out there. Check out our <u>report</u> that highlights a variety of job boards.



3 Putting yourself out there: Networking

Applying to roles the traditional way through a job board is not the only way to land a job. Attending <u>networking events</u> or requesting <u>coffee chat</u> opportunities allow you to to get in front of the hiring team or learn tips from professionals to make a positive impression.



- 4 Conquering the interview and screening process
 - i. Screenings or Assessments: Before an interview, some employers require an assessment or <u>asynchronous interview</u> to be completed before you can move on to the interview stage.
 - **ii. Interview:** You've made it past the first hurdle! You *told* the Hiring Manager that you were a good fit for the role through your application, Now the interview is your opportunity to *show* the employer why you are the best fit for the role! iii. Once you've completed the interview stage, make sure to send a thank you email!
