Choosing Law and Business as Your Major

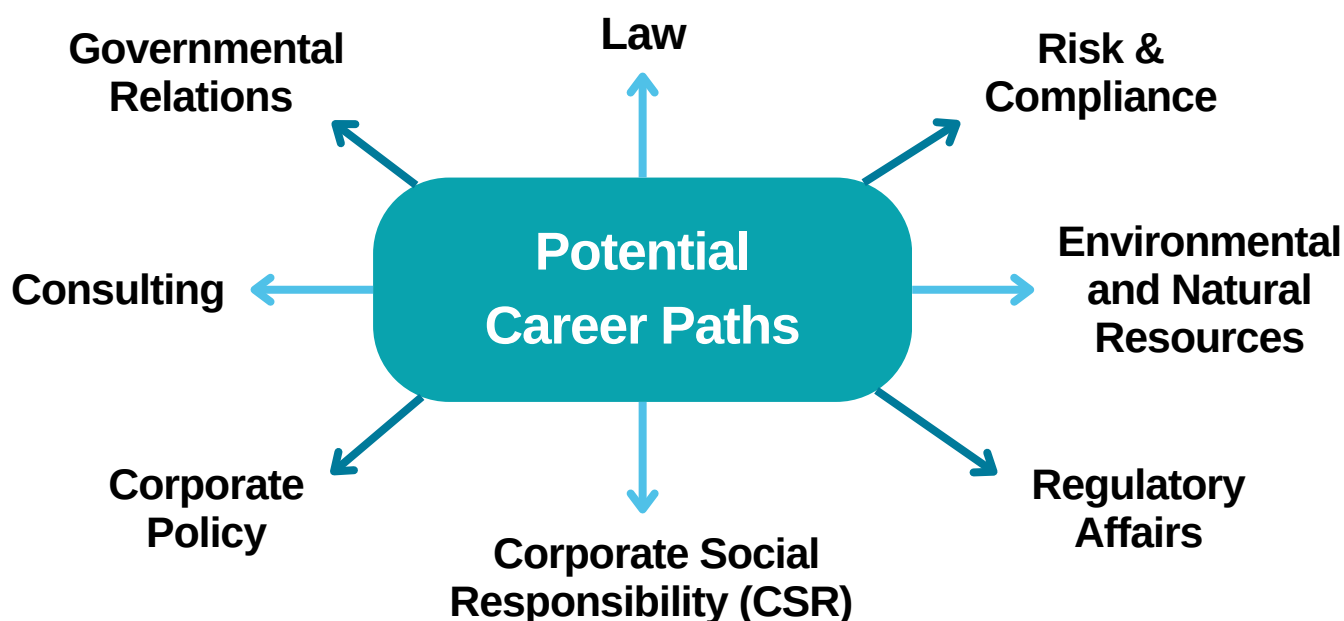
The key learnings in this academic program include critical thinking and the application of legal knowledge. You should also be able to identify organizational problems from a legal perspective, and be engaged in developing business solutions.

In addition, you will learn about contract negotiations, human resources, risk management, policy development, property transactions, corporate social responsibility and corporate governance.

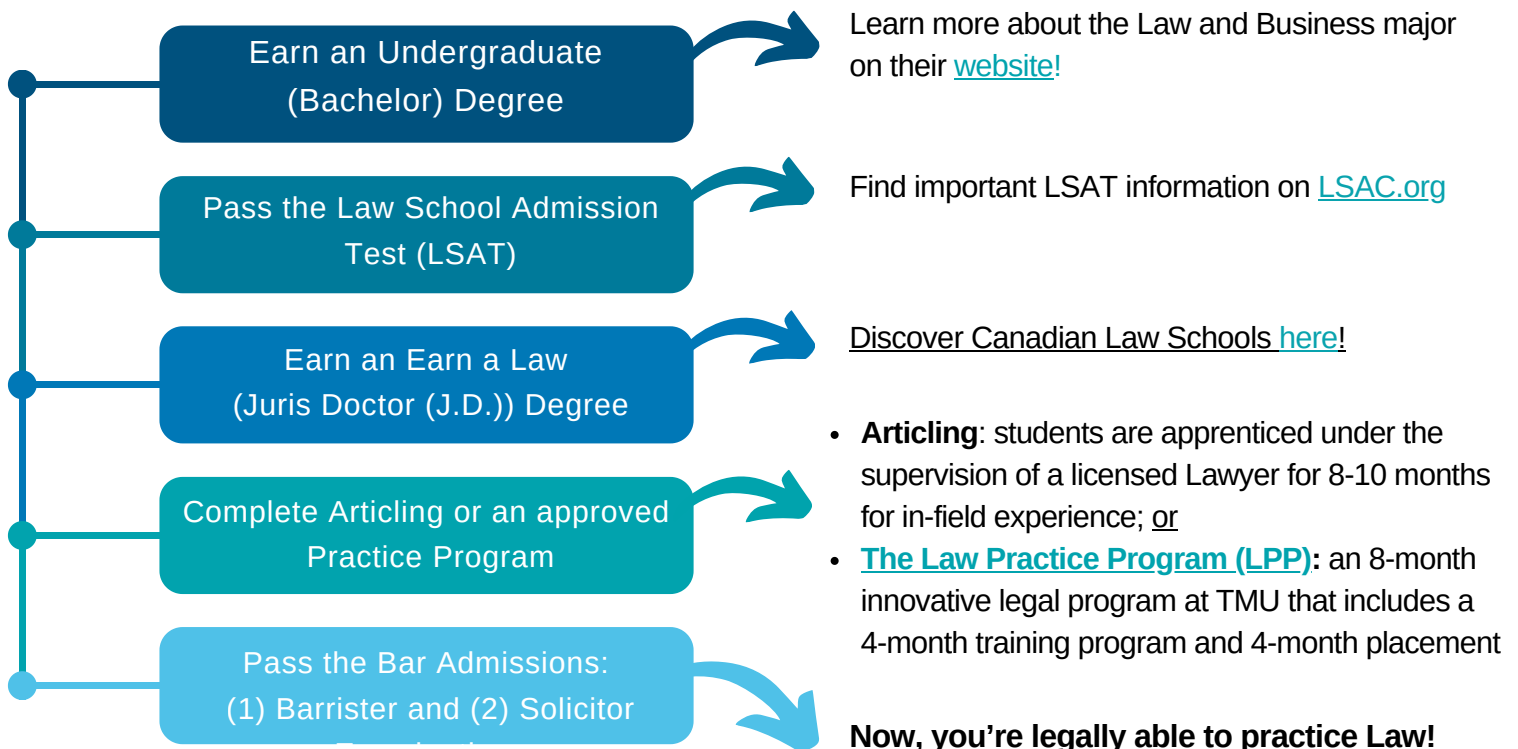
For example, [risk management](#) roles are expanding as companies invest more to protect themselves from cyber threats, supply chain disruptions, and market volatility.

From my first year of Business Management, I knew I wanted to do co-op, and choosing Law & Business didn't necessarily mean I wanted to become a lawyer. I chose L&B because I found law interesting and that the major challenged me to think critically, be detail-oriented, and argue reasonably.

My advice to future and current L&B students would be; **don't feel limited being in this major**, it's unique, one-of-a-kind, and the skills and knowledge you learn is something you can leverage in resumes, interviews, and growth opportunities.

Advice from a Non-Co-op Student!

Coming into my undergrad, I knew I wanted to go to law school but decided not to go down the co-op path. I quickly learned that gaining real experience isn't limited to co-op placements; it's about taking initiative. Getting involved with the Law and Business Student Association completely transformed my journey, helping me grow as a leader and gaining confidence. If you're even considering law school, do the Law & Business Clinic - the experience is incomparable and so unique. Definitely join co-op, and try placements in completely different industries so you can figure out what you actually enjoy. Get involved with student groups like the LBSA; networking and leadership experience matter more than you think. My own path — from co-ops to public sector work to risk management at a Bay Street firm — wasn't linear, but every experience built skills I still use today.

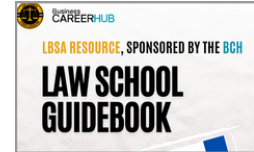
