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Campus Community: A Guide to Joining Student Groups

University life can be challenging, but it doesn't have to be a journey alone. By getting involved in student groups, you can learn more, feel more connected, and grow in ways that make your time on campus truly rewarding.

Ted Rogers Students' Society

The Ted Rogers Students' Society (TRSS) is the student-elected society that represents over 13,000+ full-time undergraduate commerce students attending the Ted Rogers School of Management at Toronto Metropolitan University.



TRSS houses all student groups under the Ted Rogers School of Management, which are categorized into two types: **course unions** and **interest groups**.

Course Union

A course union is a group within each academic department whose leadership organizes events and provides important information to students.

Interest Groups

An interest group runs events and workshops based on a shared hobby or idea.



Positions in a Student Group

Executives

Lead the organization with strategic vision and decision-making, setting overall goals and guiding the team toward success.

Vice Presidents

Oversee and manage key departments, driving departmental goals and ensuring alignment with the organization's broader objectives.

Directors

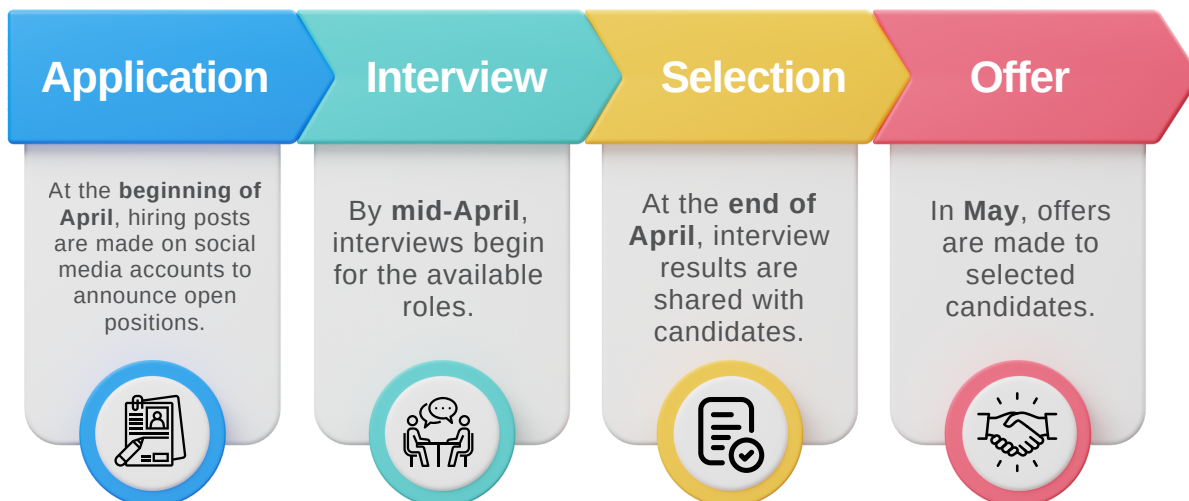
Manage specific teams or functions within departments, implementing strategies and overseeing daily operations to achieve departmental goals.

Associates

Support various departments through hands-on tasks, contributing to team success and gaining experience across different areas of the organization.

Application Timeline

The **end of the winter semester** is when most student groups hire. Each group's process varies, here is a general timeline: (**Note:** Some groups hire general associates during the **Fall semester**)



Benefits of Joining a Student Group



Skill Development: Build key skills for success, including leadership to guide teams, communication for effective interaction, and time management to stay organized and productive.



Networking Opportunities: Connect with peers and industry leaders through exclusive events, gaining valuable insights and expanding your professional network.



Social: Meet like-minded individuals and build lifelong relationships through events and activities that foster collaboration and connection.

Meet a Student Leader

The most important thing isn't necessarily past experience. Many students may not have extensive experience coming from high school, so what truly matters is the effort they put into their application. Showing commitment and willingness to learn will help them stand out. During interviews, I look for engagement and enthusiasm. The key is showing genuine interest in the student group, rather than just having the "perfect" answer. Let your authenticity and personality shine through.

I joined student groups to find a community and make an impact on the school. Working alongside people who share a common goal has been rewarding, and it has allowed me to form meaningful relationships. If I could give advice to my first-year self, it would be to attend more events—not just for networking, but to explore what truly interests me. You won't figure it all out online. Being involved in events helps you discover more about yourself and your passions. Talking to people can give you a clearer understanding of your career goals and help you plan for the future.

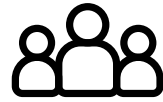
